

### Dear Travel Partner,

We write to you in a moment of great sorrow for everyone at Air India. The tragic accident involving Flight Al171 on June 12, 2025, which resulted in the loss of passengers, crew members, and individuals on the ground, has deeply impacted us all. Our thoughts remain with the families who have suffered unimaginable loss.

As we continue to provide all possible support to the next of kin, we are also working closely with relevant authorities to determine the cause of this tragedy. We are committed to keeping you informed as we move through this difficult period.

Since assuming leadership of Air India in 2022, our foremost priority has been safety. In light of the recent event, and in the interest of transparency, we would like to share the following information with you:

Our Crew: Flight Al171 was led by Captain Sumeet Sabharwal, a Line Training Captain with over 10,000 hours flying widebody aircraft. First Officer Clive Kunder, who had over 3,400 hours of flying experience, supported the flight. Both were highly trained, capable professionals.

Our Aircraft: The plane was well-maintained, with its last major check in June 2023 and the next scheduled for December 2025. Its right engine was overhauled in March 2025, and the left engine was inspected in April 2025. Both the aircraft and engines were regularly monitored, showing no issues before the flight.

These are the verified facts at present. Like the rest of the aviation industry, we await the findings of the official investigation to better understand the cause.

Arising from this tragedy, and as directed by the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) on June 14, 2025, we have been conducting thorough safety inspections on our 33 Boeing 787 aircraft. So far, inspections have been completed on 26 and these have been cleared for service. The remaining aircraft are currently in planned maintenance and will have these additional checks done before being released into service. Following the review, the DGCA has confirmed that our Boeing 787 fleet and maintenance processes fully meet safety standards.

However, the extended time required for these checks, along with heightened caution, restrictions in Middle Eastern airspace, and certain airport limitations, have unfortunately led to a higher-than-usual number of cancellations on long-haul routes.

As a proactive measure, we are also applying these enhanced checks to our Boeing 777 fleet. Given the operational implications, we have decided to temporarily reduce international widebody flying by approximately 15%, effective June 21, 2025 till July 15, 2025. This will allow us to build greater aircraft resilience into the system and ensure operational stability.

We recognise the potential impact this may have on travel plans for your customers and corporate accounts. We are committed to notifying affected passengers and offering them the choice of:

- Rebooking on alternate flights at no extra cost
- Rescheduling without penalty
- A full refund
